- 1. What contribution did intelligence make to the British war effort in the American Revolutionary War, 1775-1783?
- 2. Discuss the role of intelligence in the Union's campaign in the American Civil War, 1981-5.
- 3. How, and why, was intelligence integral to the attainment, and maintenance of US naval superiority in the war against Imperial Japan, 1941-5?
- 4. Assess the record of the FBI in countering internal 'opposition' groups and individuals from c. 1945-1975.
- 5. Assess the successes, and failings, of the US Intelligence Community (USIC) with regard to the Cuban Missile Crisis of 1962.
- 6. Did US intelligence agencies fail the policymakers in Washington DC during the Vietnam War? Or was the US Intelligence Community (USIC) just not listened to?
- 7. Account for the roots, and discuss the effectiveness, of the reforms that culminated in the so-called 'Year of Intelligence' (1975)?
- 8. To what degree are the roots of failures of the US National Security State located in the failure to identify a clear and identifiable 'mission' after the Gulf War of 1991?
- 9. To what degree was the 'War on Terror' a diversion for the US intelligence mission from the greater long-term threats between 2001 and 2017?
- 10. What are the main threats facing the US Intelligence Community (USIC) today?
  Do they represent an insurmountable task for a declining USA?
