Studying through the medium of Welsh

Degrees and Modules

Here at Aberystwyth University, we offer a high level of provision for students wishing to study through the medium of Welsh – one of the highest in Wales.

We offer opportunities for students who are fluent in Welsh, in addition to those who are less confident or learners. Students can choose to follow courses delivered entirely through the medium of Welsh, or undertake modules in both Welsh and English. This means students whose courses are mainly in English can still choose to undertake some study in Welsh.

Small class-sizes

Research shows that students who learn in small classes tend to have higher grades, and you'll have the opportunity to join a friendly and lively community of other students who are studying in Welsh.

Guarantee of a Welsh-speaking personal tutor

Perhaps you feel more confident and comfortable in Welsh, and that being able to chat with your tutor in Welsh is important to you.

Financial support

Coleg Cymraeg Cenedlaethol scholarships are available to students who study through the medium of Welsh. Also, students who study over five credits per year through the medium of Welsh will automatically receive the Aberystwyth University Welsh Medium Bursary (excluding those who study Welsh as a subject).

Innovative teaching methods

Welsh-medium modules use a range of innovative techniques, such as recorded lectures, multi-media learning resources, video conferencing, residential sessions with professional practitioners and online resources that support more traditional learning methods.

Developing vocabulary and translingual skills

While studying through the medium of Welsh, you will need to make use of English learning materials (and possibly materials in other languages). The process of working translingually – using information available in one language in another language – when writing notes and assessments will help you to better understand and interpret reading materials. This is also a fantastic opportunity to develop a subject-specific vocabulary that will be useful to you in the workplace.

Many of our other degrees offer the opportunity to study partly through the medium of Welsh.

You can study:

- 80 credits per year or more in Education and Childhood Studies, Creating Performance, International Politics, History and Law
- 40 credits per year or more in Agriculture, Business and Management, Computer Science, Geography, Physics, Data Science, Mathematics, Criminology and Biological Sciences
- some Welsh language provision in Sports Science, Space Science and Robotics, Health Science and Psychology.

The University and the Coleg Cymraeg Cenedlaethol



As a Welsh-speaking student, you can join the Coleg Cymraeg Cenedlaethol – a national institution that plays a pivotal role in planning, maintaining and developing Welsh-medium education in our universities.

The Aberystwyth University branch of the Coleg is responsible for the University's Academic Welsh-medium Strategy. You can become a member of the Coleg even before starting at university. One advantage of doing this is you'll be allocated a membership number, which you will need when applying for a scholarship.

Scholarships

> Main Scholarship - £1,000 a year

The Main Scholarship scheme is available to students who are studying degree courses that contain at least 240 credits of Welsh medium provision – so at least 80 credits through the medium of Welsh in each year.

> Incentive Scholarships - £500 a year

The Incentive Scholarship scheme is available to students who study a degree course that includes at least 120 credits of Welsh-medium provision in an eligible subject, which is at least 40 credits through the medium of Welsh in each year.

The advantages of being a member of the Coleg Cymraeg Cenedlaethol

As a member, you will receive all kinds of information, from the opportunities to study through the medium of Welsh and bilingually, to the latest news about scholarships and the academic and social activities of the Branch. You will become a member of the Coleg community as well as Aberystwyth's lively Welsh society. You can also take lessons to improve your Welsh if you want to gain a bit of confidence.

The Language Skills Certificate

You can opt to sit the Language Skills Certificate – an important qualification that enables students to show evidence of their practical Welsh skills and their ability to communicate confidently and professionally in Welsh, when speaking and writing. A sgiliau iaith tutor will provide optional sessions to support you in preparing for the Certificate by refining your professional communication skills in Welsh.

Welsh-medium resources

The Welsh College Resources Portal includes a wide range of resources to assist with learning in Welsh – from an S4C archive to textbooks in subjects as diverse as Mathematics, International Politics and Law, to Wicis on subjects such as Geography, Literature and

Theatre. The Portal also includes a dictionary of Higher Education Terms and a multi-disciplinary Welsh journal that publishes innovative research from Wales and beyond.

Support to study in Welsh

The sgiliau iaith tutor and the academic skills tutor are available to assist you with all aspects of studying through the medium of Welsh. They provide individual and group sessions, as well as in-module sessions on language and bilingual academic skills, such as using English materials when writing in Welsh, terms and academic writing. The University also provides computer resources to help you to study in Welsh, such as a spelling and Welsh-medium grammar checker, and Office programmes and interfaces in Welsh.

Improving your Welsh

Whether you are a first or second-language Welsh speaker, the University offers various opportunities for you to improve your Welsh. Along with the support sessions that are provided by the sgiliau iaith tutor, a number of modules include Gloywi laith sessions. In addition, Learn Welsh lessons are available for Welsh speakers who wish to improve their writing and presentation skills.

Studying through the medium of Welsh

Employability:

The ability to communicate confidently through the medium of Welsh and English, both orally and in writing, is very advantageous in the workplace. Studying through the medium of Welsh, or bilingually, develops these skills, leading to an advantage in the jobs market, not only over non-Welsh speaking candidates, but also those who speak Welsh but haven't developed their communication skills to a graduate standard.

97.3% of Aberystwyth graduates who studied some part of their course through the medium of Welsh are in employment or further study six months after graduating, compared with 91.5% who had not studied through the medium of Welsh.

Why are bilingual skills important to employers?

- In the public sector, there is a statutory requirement to provide services in Welsh.
- Because the public experience services in Welsh in the public sector, they expect the same level of service in the private sector.
- Customers/clients appreciate receiving services in Welsh.
- Showing respect to customers/clients and the wider community by providing a Welsh experience is important to the reputation of the business or service.
- Attracting new customers/clients and keeping them can increase revenue.
- Promoting both Welsh and English in the workplace reflects societal values around culture, identity and equality.

Journalist

Studying Professional Welsh was a very solid foundation for me as I searched for a job as a journalist. During the course, we gained experience of printing a magazine, writing press releases and preparing copy - these are all practical skills that also make use of your Welsh, and they are skills I still rely on today in my daily work.

Without sounding like a cliché, being able to speak and write correct Welsh of a high standard is a big advantage when looking for work. In my experience, employers are always looking for someone they can trust in terms of language accuracy.

Aberystwyth is the perfect place to be a student. The three years I spent in Pantycelyn and then in the town itself are among the happiest times in my life. Take every opportunity during your time at Aber – you'll only regret the things you didn't get the chance to do. It's also good to put yourself in situations you're not entirely comfortable in sometimes (such as going to cynghanedd lessons!).

Barrister

I studied Law at Aberystwyth University and had an excellent experience of studying through the medium of Welsh. There was extensive Welsh provision in the department, so a number of modules were taught entirely through Welsh. As a result, I was in smaller groups for a number of lectures and seminars, which gave me the opportunity to interact more with my fellow students. I received the Main Scholarship from Coleg Cymraeg Cenedlaethol for studying partly through Welsh, and this contributed towards buying books and goods, and reduced financial pressures to enable me to concentrate on my studies.

I have now trained as a barrister and practise in the family, criminal and civil courts. Studying through Welsh has helped me reach my dream career as I am able to discuss complex legal problems in the two legal languages of Wales, and also speak to clients in the language they are most comfortable in. I am now a tenant in the chamber that has the most Welsh speakers in Wales, and studying through Welsh has certainly helped me get to where I am now in my career.

Aberystwyth was perfect for me - the staff of the Welsh Language Department and the History Department looked after me very well. It was easy to settle here as the town is so beautiful and there is plenty of Welsh around. You can't beat walking along the prom and seeing the starlings fly during golden hour!

I did receive financial support and that was a great help to me during my University period. It encouraged me to choose Welshmedium modules. I also received the Evan Morgan Scholarship and a scholarship from the Coleg Cymraeg Cenedlaethol - these were a big boost for me.

Welcome from UMCA's President


Hello, I'm Elain and I'm the UMCA President for 2024/25. I hope you're looking forward to your time as a student here with us at Aberystwyth.

If you want to live and study through the medium of Welsh at Aberystwyth, you won't experience the full strength of the close-knit community that we have here without joining UMCA or Y Geltaidd, or both!

UMCA is the first union of its kind in Wales, and it has a wealth of experience in campaigning for the interests of the University's Welsh students and protecting their rights not only here in Aberystwyth, but also nationally, by taking a leading role in the campaign to establish the Coleg Cymraeg Cenedlaethol for example. Today, it is a very influential movement that has a voice and representation on some of the University's main committees.

Activities

UMCA supports a number of popular Welsh societies, such as Y Geltaidd (Aberystwyth University's main Welsh sports society), Plaid Ifanc (the youth branch of Plaid Cymru), and Aelwyd Pantycelyn (for those who enjoy singing or reciting).

UMCA organises a variety of activities jointly with the Coleg Cymraeg Cenedlaethol, and the UMCA President works closely with the Coleg to ensure that we provide a variety of activities to suit all tastes.

UMCA and Welsh

UMCA isn't only for Welsh speakers. UMCA also offers free Welsh lessons to students, and by joining UMCA members can learn about Welsh language and culture. A Paned a Sgwrs (Cuppa and Chat) night is held by UMCA's Second Language Officers and the President in Pantycelyn.

The student voice

UMCA has been protecting the interests and rights of the University's Welsh students since 1973. The Union's activities range from organising entertainment and events to campaigning on educational, social and language-related matters in the University and beyond.

Support

Welcome Week

When you arrive at University in September, you will get the chance to experience Welcome Week – a fun-packed week of socialising that is organised by the Students' Union and UMCA. First-year students will often be paired with a second or third-year student for some of the activities, which means you will get to know a wide cross-section of students by the end of your first week! Some of UMCAs events during Welcome Week include a karaoke night, a gig with some of the best Welsh bands in Wales, and a quiz night at Yr Hen Lew Du pub - the haven of the Welsh community in Aberystwyth.

UMCA societies

Aelwyd Pantycelyn

This is one of the best known of the UMCA societies – a society that meets once a week to sing, recite and perform. It's a great way to get to know other students who enjoy performing, and it's a bonus that it's done through the medium of Welsh. There is something to suit everybody! Highlights include the local and national eisteddfod competitions, the yearly Christmas Concert, and a host of other concerts. If performing is in your blood, Aelwyd Panty is the place for you.

Y Geltaidd

In essence, the Geltaidd is a Welsh sports society and the oldest university society in Wales. If you like sports and want to continue to play while at university, you will have plenty of opportunities to do so. Currently, the Geltaidd features men's and women's rugby teams, men's and women's football teams, as well as a netball team. And, if supporting the Wales Rugby team is important to you, you won't want to miss the main trip of the year - travelling to one of the games in the Six Nations Championship. C'mon Cymru!









UMCA's yearly calendarmain events

UMCA organises a range of social activities throughout the year. Here are the main ones:

September / October

Welcome Week -September

A fun-packed week of socialising to welcome you to university. New students are often paired with students from one of the higher years and get to know a good cross-section of students by the end of the first week!

Tregaron Trip - early October

UMCA's Tregaron Trip is an annual event and a great opportunity to visit the town.

November

The Inter-College Dance - November

The highlight of the year for any Welsh student - students from across Wales and beyond come together in Aberystwyth to enjoy a fantastic evening of music, in what is one of the best weekends of the Welsh rock scene.

January / February

Refresher Week - January

A chance to enjoy a week full of events after the exam period.

Inter-College Eisteddfod - end of February

The Eisteddfod travels between the Welsh universities – a chance for friendly competition but most importantly to make new friends. There is also a sports tournament on the Friday before the Eisteddfod.

March / April

RAG Week

- March/April

A week of raising money for two charities through a variety of events, such as a car wash in Pantycelyn, Sports, a Mystery Trip, Sŵn and a darts tournament.

May / June

Aber 7s - May

Rugby teams from all over Wales are welcomed to the Aberystwyth Students' Union rugby tournament on the first Bank Holiday weekend in May.

Competing in the Urdd - May

Aelwyd Pantycelyn travels to the Urdd Eisteddfod to compete against other Aelwydydd in Wales.


Nefi Blŵ Week - June

Hall for Welsh students

Single en-suite rooms

Pantycelyn costs around £200 per week, with a resident's contract of a total of 33 weeks. The fee for the accommodation includes all bills, internet connection (cable and WiFi), personal contents insurance and Platinum membership of the Sports Centre.

As a catered hall, students can have breakfast and an evening meal in the 'Ffreutur' on the ground floor from Monday to Friday. However, residents can use their catering allowance of around £60 per week at any time, and in any catering facility across the University.

This will give you the freedom to use your catering allowance in the way that best suits you. Pantycelyn also has small kitchens that include the following equipment:

- Microwave oven
- Toaster
- Fridge/Freezer
- Sink
